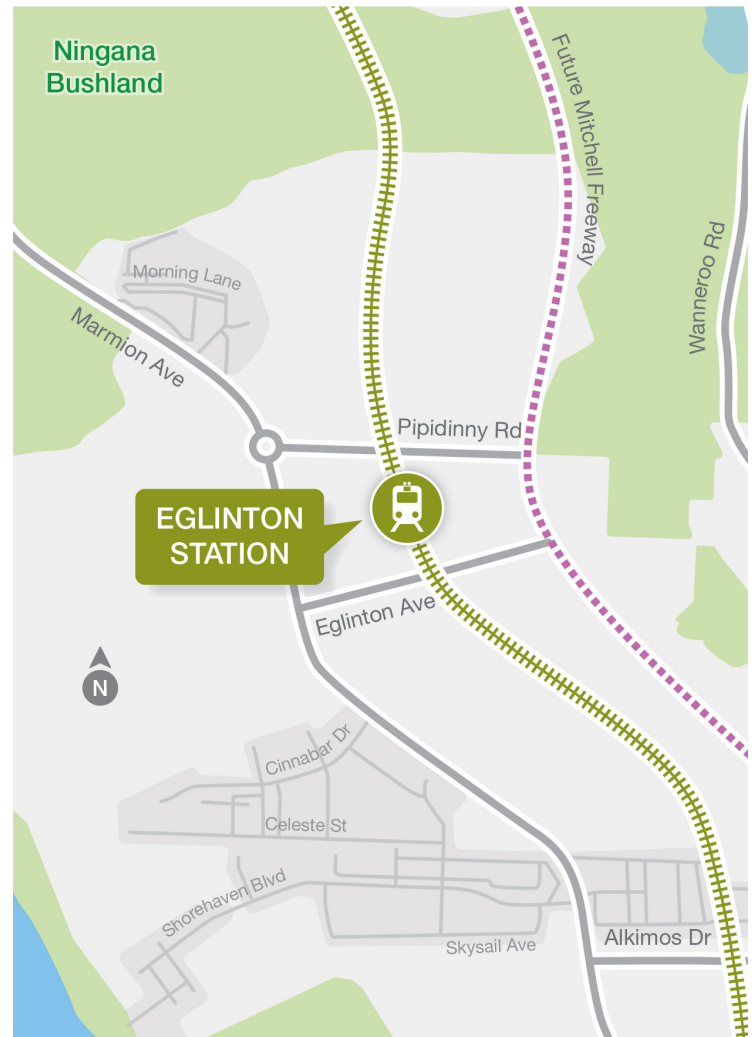


Eglinton Station

Approximately 46 minutes from Perth by train, Eglinton Station will be built in a cutting at the edge of the future Eglinton District Centre.

Eglinton Station will be built south of Pipidinny Road, east of Marmion Avenue and west of Wanneroo Road, and is designed to support a localised community.

Accessed via a station building at ground-level, the station will have two platforms located in a cutting with at least 50 per cent coverage.



Station features



Two 150m long platforms with 50 per cent coverage to provide weather protection for passengers.



400 passenger parking bays and dedicated passenger drop-off area.



Shared path connection to Marmion Avenue.



Two secure bicycle parking shelters, bike u-rails and the ability to add more as cycling path demand increases.



Eight bus stands with weather protection, seating and information facilities.



Passenger ticketing/information, storage/cleaning and operational facilities.

Station design

Embracing the principle of 'openness' through the its entry areas, Eglinton Station will focus on using natural light to welcome passengers.

This design supports the station's position as the centrepiece of the planned neighbourhood precinct, which will cater for passengers from day one of operations.

The station's forecourt will include feature paving, seating walls, planting, and shade trees where possible. A variety of native species will also be used in the landscaping of the station's car park.



Station architecture

Early investigations conducted with METRONET's Noongar Reference Group to identify important local flora species, such as *Eucalyptus Globulus* woodlands and *Grevillea Preissii*, has influenced Eglinton Station's architecture.

Noongar people often called flowering shrubs, such as grevilleas, Berrung. *Grevillea nectar* was an important source of sweetness in Noongar food. Nectar could be sucked directly from the flowers themselves, or sweet drinks could be made by soaking the flowers in water. *Grevillea Preissii* is widely used in landscaping today for its low water requirements and bird-attracting qualities.



Station access

A number of new roads will be built to provide vehicle access, with the car park and drop-off area located northwest of Eglinton Station.

A shared path will connect to Eglinton Station via Pipidiny Road. Bicycle storage facilities will be conveniently located within the Station precinct.

Lifts will be located outside the flow of foot traffic, and the station will incorporate audio loops in areas adjacent to passenger facilities to assist the hearing impaired. The station will be fully compliant with the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* as the project team continues to consult with the METRONET Access and Inclusion Reference Group.

Precinct development

Eglinton Station is located within the Eglinton District Centre, a development of privately-owned, unused land, which is planned to support a predominately residential community with services, facilities and jobs that reflect the immediate needs of the local area.

To create a comfortable, safe and active pedestrian environment in and Eglinton Station, 'main street' principles will be applied.

Landowner consultation will continue to ensure the plan and proposed station design supports and responds to the State Government and landowner's vision for the area.

About the project

METRONET's Yanchep Rail Extension will extend the Joondalup Line 14.5 kilometres north with new stations at Alkimos, Eglinton and Yanchep.

The project will deliver nine road-over-rail bridges, three green bridges and an underpass for animals to safely cross the rail corridor. The project is a catalyst for progressive mixed use development around each station that will provide local amenity, services and employment.

The extension will give more than 150,000 future Yanchep-Two Rocks residents another transport option to travel around Perth. With stations planned at Alkimos, Eglinton and Yanchep, early designs show how stations will fit within the planned development areas and cater for passengers on day one of operations.
